Committee met on February 19 to discuss preliminary plans for 218 Yale, SE. There was a lot of opposition to any solar variance and also great concern about the density/parking problems. Suggestions made to make the front apartment face Yale and perhaps a second story take advantage of the view to Sandia Mountain. Don talked with Allen Lewis, the developer, after the committee meeting and will convey additional board views to him. The property at the 424 Vassar, SE is being advertised for development, so we'll check with zoning enforcement. Zone change request for 2500 Garfield is being filed. We're not generally supportive of the idea, but will see about the mediation meeting, and talk with Victory Hills and then discuss a position.

Sherry, Don, and Cathleen Orr attended the Patrol Training on April 16, so they and Marlene can begin the patrol and others can ride with them until they attend the training. Sherry was in touch with Victory Hills; they wonder if Sherry could go to the meeting tomorrow night, and she will, if the application is continuing. Allen Lewis, the owner of 218 Yale will not proceed with the plan that would require variances. Agreed to have a special meeting on a Thursday in late May or June.

Gilchrist House – Meeting in the mayor's office today with the property owners; no decision yet. UHA's letter was considered at the meeting.

Agreed to ask for a board meeting with the mayor to ask him for help on our twin concerns – the historic property and the parking permit issues. Don will make the request.

City Council Redistricting Committee meets on Wednesday, August 3 at 6 at City Council Chambers. Marlene is promoting a Solar Albuquerque project (modeled after Solar San Antonio), which could begin in the UHA area. The idea is to get landowners to sign a contract with installers, and some of the profits come back to the neighborhood association or to low-income people. Agreed that we are interested and will review a proposal from Marlene.

Lanny suggests that if we aren't having permit parking, we might consider later in the fall when it's cooler. Food donated by Frontier, Einstein's Bagels, Papa John's, Lanny Heinlen, and Julie Ahern.
- B. Police Officer Appreciation Greg attended and gave the \$50 association donation.
- C. Neighborhood Patrol Three additional people signed up at the Block Party, so we now have 4 people trained, plus five others. We'll start patrolling this month, pairing one of the trained people with one of the untrained. Marlene also has prepared a log sheet. There are no other trainings scheduled, but we can recruit some more people and then have a special training. Sherry is calling the police about cars blocking sidewalks and will take the patrol supply bag and get started.
- D. Gilchrist House Mayor isn't going to use the city repair ordinance, so presumably the demolition permit will be signed soon. Agreed that UHA would write a letter to the Mayor, Planning Director, and property owners telling them that a new zone change is needed before anything can be built and asking for meetings with the neighborhood before any zone change request is submitted.
- E. SolarizeAlbuquerque Marlene has talked with one of the photovoltaic owners about the nonprofit idea, and he might do it as a project. So Marlene wants to defer the discussion until more details are worked out.

I. Preliminary Items

- A. Call to order Lanny Heinlen called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m.
- B. Introductions Lanny Heinlen, Sherry Smith, Gregory Hartmen, Jennifer Simpson, Joseph Aguirre, Paulette Higgins, Brian Stinar, and Don Hancock.

II. Presentation by Councilor Isaac Benton. There have been issues about the Silver Bike Boulevard and whether parking should be limited to one side. Councilor Benton also supported a bill in the state legislature to allow bikes to yield at stop signs. He appreciates UHA's support for the Lead and Coal improvements and the street bond issue. On redistricting, there is a requirement for a third Westside district because of its increasing population. In 2001, Mid Heights District 5 was moved to the west side, and he would like the same thing to be done again so that surrounding districts absorb the areas. The options this time seem to be district 3 or 7 to move to the west side. Adding districts takes a charter amendment, so would take some years to do. The last redistricting committee meeting is scheduled for Friday night, October 14 at 6 at City Council chambers. He expects Council consideration to begin in November, with final action by the end of the year, after the new Council takes office on December 1. The redistricting committee will likely propose two or three maps. Lanny encourages everyone to attend the October 14 committee.

III. Presentation by Sujay Thakur about day care/renovation of Gilchrist house.

Sujay has a letter of intent to purchase the four lots from the current owners pending a zone change to allow day care in addition to the existing uses. Sujay, his father, Joseph Aguirre, Don Hancock, Rick Wild, and Ann Carson went through the house this afternoon. He is excited because he believes that at least one room at the house can be used. He presented a draft layout plan for the house and new addition and explained that because of the price of the property, he would want about 3,600 square feet of indoor capacity for about 100 children in 6 rooms, plus about 1,500 square feet of storage, on the east and south sides of the house. He expects that there would be 70 children or so at any time. At his existing child care, he has 110 enrolled, but only about 55 at a time. Parking would be off the alley and he'd like a drop off along one of the streets. The north and west sides would be outside play space. There would be a 6' high decorative rock wall around the playground. He thinks that saving the house costs about \$100,000 more than demolition and building new. The justification for the zone change would be to renovate the property and because day care is needed in the area. He also has looked at other possible properties in the neighborhood, but this is the only location remaining that he'd like to use. He doesn't want to do evenings and weekends because it's not economical at his Coors location; he would be willing to also put hour restrictions in the zoning. He met with his banker yesterday; they want a letter of support from neighborhood association. Current loan is \$650,000 with \$3,500 rental income a month. He would build the new house in the empty southernmost house and thinks the project is economically viable. Ultimately, he might like to move the two-story house to make it a children's garden. Rick Wild and Julie Ahern live across the street and believe that the house is worth saving.

On Saturdays, people don't pay the kiosks, so they may start enforcing on Saturdays. They also cite for people who park on the sidewalks. Ms. Bruce has started booting cars with three unpaid parking citations; there is a once-a-week boot tactical plan with two officers who check cars parked on the street. People that are booted have to clear up the violations in Metro Court, then pay \$50 removal fees. If you have special construction or related needs, call Nina and she will send a letter for temporary authorizations. If there are particular violations to report, call 924-3950, which is parking administration. City parking tickets are white envelopes, private lots use yellow envelopes.

They would like our support for renovation. They also will be doing a march on Saturday from a Wells Fargo Bank to one of the credit unions. Their meetings at Yale Park are at 6 each day. We will put them in touch with the owners of the Gilchrist house.

UHA would encourage meetings and discussion before any zone change request is filed with the city.

- E. Open forum Rick Wild who lives 205 Cornell since 1987 brought pictures of how the street is frequently parked full. His concern was that the day care would be too intense and too much parking both at the night and day. Paulette says that on-street parking also is a problem on the 100 block of Stanford. Rick also is concerned the dirt blowing and the weeds at the properties. Mr. Lopez is an attorney and is running for the New Mexico Court of Appeals in the 2012 election, he lives on Graceland and his son lives near Silver and Buena Vista. He's interested in public financing of elections, which applies to the Court of Appeals; he needs 1,200 \$5 contributions to get public financing. He'd like to establish the example of a publicly financed candidate for a statewide office being able to run and win. For the primary, there would be \$60,000 for candidate, though his Democratic opponent is not doing public financing; and about \$130,000 for the general election. In 1996, he ran for court of appeals with about \$90,000. In 2010, Linda Vanzi won for the office with about \$130,000. Marlene said that there was a break-in next door, when the owner left with his dogs. Sherry said another property with a newly moved in owner also got robbed. Joseph wondered about the neighborhood traffic management group that was noticed

by Diane Dolan in Councilor Benton's office; Joseph will followup. Paulette is concerned about the repeated gas leaks at 201 Stanford, SE.

IV. Action/followup items

- A. 202 Cornell, SE zone change Nothing further.
- B. City Council Redistricting Concerns about losing District 3 to the west side. Lanny proposes that we support any plan that maintains UHA within the historic neighborhoods because of the unique community of interest. Agreed to delegate to Joseph, Gregory, Lanny, and Don to come up with a plan and support before the Council.
- C. Annual meeting Sunday, January 29 at 2, at Outpost Performance Space. Lanny will work on the agenda. We'll ask Maggie Seeley to again facilitate the meeting. For the newsletter, Marlene will put in an article about the responsibilities of a board member and other responsibilities to try to have people think about the jobs in advance.
