KEEPING IT CLEAN—OUR RIVER, THAT IS

Everything that goes into the storm sewer goes straight into the river - it doesn't get treated first. Storm water is the primary source of river pollution. River pollution negatively affects recreation, the environment and increases the risk of flooding. YOU can do your part to stop river pollution by:

- Preventing sanitary sewer backups by disposing of fats, oil, grease and food debris in the trash, and using a drain screen in showers and sinks to catch hair and solids.
- Never dump waste (including paint and biodegradable cleaners) into or near storm drains!
- Minimize your use of pesticides and fertilizers, and don't use when it might rain within two days.
- Prevent dirt from blowing or washing away
- Take your car to a commercial car wash where the waste water must be treated.
- Pick up after your pets and dispose of their waste in the trash or toilet
- Don't litter, and pick up trash whenever possible
- Fix vehicle leaks

LEAD & COAL, AGAIN, STILL

Excessive speed, increased traffic, and frequent collisions, make Lead and Coal Avenues very unsafe. Additionally, the proximity of Lead and Coal to homes, businesses, and apartments makes collisions even more dangerous and unnerving. These accidents happen on a regular basis destroying both public and private property, putting pedestrians and cyclists at increased risk, and creating an environment that is unsafe.

The negative health consequences from traffic on Lead/Coal include but are not limited to: damage to property, damage to automobiles, hearing loss, breathing problems, and anxiety.

Traffic collisions on Lead/Coal occur weekly, and sometimes multiple times per day—the need for action from the City of Albuquerque is urgent. Though this uptick in vehicular traffic-caused safety problems has been exacerbated by the A.R.T. project on Central, we believe the problem lies primarily in the design of Lead/Coal. Auto collisions and excess speeding has been witnessed and documented since the completion of the Lead/Coal lane reduction in June 2012.

UHA is requesting from the City Council, the Mayor's office, and the Office of Municipal Development a comprehensive safety and health study of the neighborhood impact from traffic on Lead and Coal, and that any sensible recommendations from this study be implemented as quickly as possible.

If you are negatively impacted by Lead/Coal traffic, join us in building a coalition of residents (renters and owners), business owners, and Neighborhood Associations. We also welcome you to help document the many auto collisions on Lead/Coal by uploading your unique photos to our public Google Album (https://photos.app.goo.gl/TihJCRUFESxQkfF32), which contains resident-submitted photos of a fraction of the auto collisions on Lead/Coal since June 2012.
