New Round of Dead Tree Removal in UHA parkways

In response to a request from UHA, Bernalillo County Commissioner Maggie Hart Stebbins and former City Councilor Rey Garduño have secured equal amounts of County and City funds for a \$10,800 project to remove a number of dead trees from University Heights parkways (the strip of public property between the curb and sidewalk). The trees to be removed were identified in a series of surveys last year. The work will be done by a private contractor and overseen by Joran Viers, City Forester, with the Parks and Recreation Department. Owners of corresponding properties will be notified by

door-to-door flyer, by mail, and the list of target trees and addresses will be posted at uhanm.org. Work is expected to begin in the next month or two.

This project is the most recent in a long history of UHA parkway tree removal and tree planting efforts. UHA still has some funds for tree planting, will attempt to increase those funds, and the 2016 board will review and state how those monies can be used this year. In the past, UHA has subsidized the cost of new trees on the parkways for property owners.

As with previous tree removal work, UHA will attempt to make bark mulch from this project available to the community.

SILVER BLVD SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS

City Councilor Rey Garduño supported a study of the safety of the Silver Bicycle Boulevard from Yale to San Mateo that was requested by UHA. The study determined that there are too many vehicles traveling too fast (not in compliance with the 18 mph speed limit) and that there are other deficiencies. Through a task force of city officials and neighborhood representatives (including from UHA and Nob Hill) and a public meeting on September 28, 2015, a plan has been developed to address safety issues. Throughout the study area, additional signs and pavement markings



would better identify that Silver is a Bike Boulevard with an 18 mph speed limit. Curb Bulbouts would be constructed at all intersection corners and some alleys (including the PNM substation between Harvard and Cornell), and no parking areas would be better marked with signs and yellow paint.

Between Yale and Girard, north-south streets would have stop signs at Silver, except at Princeton and Cornell, where traffic circles would be constructed to slow the traffic on Silver. At the Yale/Silver

intersection, a median crossing would be installed to protect bicycles and more clearly delineate the east-west bicycle route. At the Girard/Silver intersection, a median diverter would be installed to allow bicycle through traffic but require vehicles to right turn on and off of Silver, except that southbound traffic could turn left (eastbound), so as to provide access to Nob Hill businesses.

Because of financial resource limits and the immediate need for improvements, the task force recommended that the initial implementation area be from Yale to Carlisle. New Councilor Pat Davis will be asked to provide the funding for that phase, which would hopefully be implemented this summer.

Neighborhood Info and How You Can Stay Connected

It is easier than ever to stay in touch and get things done. There are a couple of great APPs and websites out there to help. Check out NextDoor.com—when you input your address, the APP will know your neighborhood. You'll find lively discussions about break ins, the bus rapid transit debate and even classified ads where you can find a place to rent or a great place to eat or get your shoes fixed. It is similar to Facebook but focused on neighborhoods. Your address is not given to others and you can opt to get information about adjoining neighborhoods.

Another great APP is ABQ 311. This APP is directly connected to the City of Albuquerque to report issues, see bus schedules, find out about recycling and even keep in sync with local government and City issues. I use this APP regularly to report items left on curbs or in alleys that need to be picked up by the Solid Waste Department. I also report graffiti, weeds and litter issues.

An additional APP, NM Justice, is connected to the local NM ACLU. If you see a situation that you want to capture on your phone that has to do with an injustice, use this APP to record the situation. If the phone is taken from you or destroyed, once the recording is stopped, the footage is automatically uploaded to the ACLU. This easy-to-use APP is also used in other states by the ACLU.
