Regarding future tax credits

Homeowners may be able to claim New Mexico tax credits for qualifying, pre-approved work like reroofing, new heating and cooling, new electrical service, new water and sewer pipes under the house and to the street, restoring wood floors, and purchasing a NM Register plaque. The credits cover 50% of qualifying costs and are applied directly against New Mexico income tax. You get up to five years to use them.

Some costs like window replacement, additions, landscaping, maintenance, and demolition are not generally eligible. Work must be approved before it is started. This can take a couple of months. LEAD-COAL IMPROVEMENTS UPDATE

For decades, residents of UHA have been very concerned about road departure accidents and other health and safety impacts of those one-ways. The 2022 Mid-Region Metropolitan Planning Organization/USDOT Federal Highway Administration Road Safety Audit (RSA) identified many possible improvements.

Before implementing any of the 19 RSA recommendations, the mayor's office required a comprehensive traffic study, which Lee Engineering conducted in 2024 and early 2025. On March 27, 2025, the Final Report (109 pages) was issued, along with Appendixes (1,105 pages) with the data collected, modeling results of various alternatives, and public input from three public meetings and the Task Force. Since the scope of the Study was from Washington to Broadway, the Task Force included residents from UHA and Nob Hill, as well as Silver Hill and Huning Heights neighborhoods.

The Study examined the entire corridor in three segments – Washington to Yale, Yale to I-25, and I-25 to Broadway. Options are one lane one-ways, two-way streets, or enhanced safety improvements. The segments have unique characteristics and could have different changes.

On May 8, 2025, the Lead-Coal Safety Brigade and State Senator Sedillo Lopez convened a meeting that included people from UHA and Nob Hill, the mayor's office, City Councilor Nichole Rogers, and State Representative Anaya to consider next steps. Available funding from the previous state legislature's capital outlays total \$826,490. The City Department of Municipal Development will respond to the Study in June or July. Then the Lead-Coal Working Group will reconvene to provide further input into next steps. In the meantime, Councilor Rogers is trying to get additional speed cameras installed, and the state legislators will discuss the process of the state designating a Safety Corridor.
