New Trees! Thanks to ABQ NeighborWoods

ABQ NeighborWoods is a collaboration between Tree New Mexico, the City of Albuquerque, New Mexico State Forestry, Southwest Tree Specialists, local tree growers, neighborhood leaders, and local landscape architects to enhance our urban forest. In the past 3 years they have planted over 3000 free trees in the neighborhoods of Albuquerque.

Despite COVID restrictions, Tree New Mexico was able to complete all the Albuquerque NeighborWoods Spring plantings under a plan approved by the Office of Emergency Management. There are now 432 new trees in Albuquerque, of which 50 were planted by volunteers in our own University Heights neighborhood.

Once our neighborhood was selected for the program this Spring, our streetscape was canvassed for suitable locations to plant trees, which were required to be located within 20 feet from the street. Owners were contacted, trees were selected, and in May, 50 of the trees were planted, staked, and mulched by the Tree New Mexico organization of volunteers. As an incentive the City of Albuquerque allowed for water rebates for those that agreed to the planting of the trees.

Additionally, in September, 50 smaller 5-gallon free trees were picked up by individual homeowners in the neighborhood which they planted in ideal locations around their homes. While improving the curb appeal in our University Heights neighborhood, this program continues cycling each year through various neighborhoods around the city, increasing the tree canopy and beautifying streetscapes across the city.

A special thanks to our own city councilor Pat Davis for selecting our neighborhood and thank you to the neighbors who planted trees and to all the volunteers with Tree New Mexico. These trees will continue to grow and add beauty around us. As a reminder, if you were a tree recipient, please ensure the trees planted are watered periodically through the winter months to ensure their root structure gets established.
